November 2021 – Oxford, Michigan: Oxford High School Mass Shooting

When/Where

LCC responded within 24 hours of an invite to Oxford, Michigan, following a mass shooting that occurred on November 30, 2021, at Oxford High School in the Detroit exurb of Oxford Township, Michigan. Four students were killed and seven people were injured, including a teacher. Authorities arrested and charged 15-year-old sophomore.

What

LCC K-9 and Hearts of Mercy & Compassion (HMC) Ministry teams served with open hearts to listen to the hurting, bringing them hope, comfort, and prayer.

The hearts/crosses were placed at the memorial at Oxford High School for people to sign and leave condolence messages, pray, and pay their respects to the four lives lost.

Here are just a few stories:

- A family came up to the Comfort Dogs and their handlers during the memorial service. The son sat on the planters by the team. Anna and Claudia got closer and closer to him, sensing he was in need of comfort and unconditional love. The handlers found out the son was having a hard time after the shooting. Claudia and Anna would not leave his side.

- After the visit at Journey Lutheran Church and Early Childhood Center, we received a heartwarming thank you note from a dad:

I'm just a dad who has seen the heartbreaking effect the tragedy in Oxford has had on my 23-year-old daughter. The tragedy that happened at Oxford High School has a ripple effect throughout our small community.

I just wanted to thank you for being here today at Journey Lutheran in Oxford. My daughter is a preschool teacher at Journey. The unconditional love that you brought with your comfort dogs was a much-needed jolt of compassion. I know it truly was the medicine my daughter needed today. I know my daughter wasn't your sole audience this morning at Journey. But I know by her texts, she was definitely a beneficiary of your goodwill and love.

Again, thank you for being in our community at this troubling time.

- During the teams' visit at Meijer, which served as a reunification center, a mom met us with her three kids. Here is a testimony she shared with us:

My heart is absolutely hurting. I can't think straight. When I am alone with my thoughts the world feels so incredibly broken. I have spent nearly the entire day on the verge of tears thinking about humans and how their choices hurt others. Typically during times like this, I am driven to help in some way. Not this time. I am frozen and can hardly move.

I took the kids today to Meijers and we were greeted at the door by beautiful dogs. I learned that these dogs traveled with their handlers from other states to bring comfort to our community. Not only did they bring us sweet, goofy, lovable, dogs to love up, but the idea that these people took time out of their lives to travel to us brought me hope.

I have been reminded to "look for the helpers". The helpers do so much more than their task, they truly do bring peace, hope, and love to our world. Thank you to all the helpers. You remind me of all that is good in the world.

LCC responded within 24 hours of an invite to Waukesha, Wisconsin, following a Christmas parade attack. On November 21, 2021, the driver of a sport utility vehicle (SUV) killed six people and injured sixty-two others by hitting participants and observers at the annual Christmas parade in Waukesha, Wisconsin.

What

LCC K-9 Ministry teams served the families, students, community, and the first responders who serve them.

LCC Hearts of Mercy & Compassion, Crosses for Losses were placed at the Veterans Park memorial site for people to sign and leave condolence messages, pray, and pay their respects to the six lives lost. A Heart of Mercy & Compassion was presented to the City of Waukesha 911 Dispatch and Waukesha Police Department in appreciation of their dedication and service.

July 2021 – Surfside, Florida: Champlain Towers South Condominium Collapse

When/Where

LCC responded within 24 hours of an invite to Surfside, Florida, to a partial collapse of Champlain Towers South, a 12-story beachfront condominium in the Miami suburb of Surfside, Florida that occurred on June 24, 2021. Ninety-eight people died. Four people were rescued from the rubble, but one died of injuries shortly after arriving at the hospital. Eleven others were injured. Approximately 35 were rescued the same day from the uncollapsed portion of the building, which was demolished 10 days later.

What

LCC K-9 Ministry teams served first responders and their families working around the clock doing search and rescue, as well as family members who have lost loved ones, and all those affected by this tragic event.

LCC Hearts of Mercy & Compassion sent hearts and markers for the memorial site in Surfside, Florida. One was placed for everyone who has not survived this horrific tragedy. Visitors to the memorial site could sign and leave condolence messages.

Hello,

I am a Lieutenant Firefighter/paramedic with PBG Fire Rescue with the assignment on 7/7-7/8 throughout the night of finding victims in this horrible tragedy.

I met Peace, golden retriever, at Surfside, right after recovering victims from the pile approximately around noon on 7/8 and prior to leaving the site, awaiting the bus for transport. I felt a sense of happiness overwhelm me with meeting Peace as well as the other comfort dogs that were there. All the people that were associated with the dogs were very kind, and a warm feeling came over me. After searching on that pile and recovering victims, it leaves a sense of sadness, fear, and somberness in your heart. It makes me wonder about the families that were directly affected by the losses of their loved ones.

You are a group of kind people, and dogs were definitely a good thing to see right afterwards and gave me a happy feeling that, believe it or not, is all I needed to elevate my mood and sad feeling at that time. I want you to know that your job is not unnoticed, and your mission is definitely worth it. Me and my crew of 3 all feel the same. Thank you for giving me the stuffed little brown dog. The woman that was holding the dog left a good memory in my heart.

When/Where

LCC responded within 24 hours of an invite to San Jose, California, to a mass shooting at a Santa Clara Valley Transportation Authority (VTA) rail yard that occurred on May 26, 2021. Ten people were killed during the shooting, including the gunman, identified as 57-year-old VTA employee Samuel James Cassidy, who committed suicide. It is the deadliest mass shooting in the history of the San Francisco Bay Area.

- On Friday, May 28, Micah and Rahab Comfort Dogs, with their ministry teams, were present at the vigil at Sikh Gurdwara San Jose. The teams were there to honor the victims of the VTA shooting and support the hurting community.
- Rahab's Comfort Dog handler shared this reflection, "Saturday was my first time deploying and the entire day gave clarity to the word "Presence" that I have heard over and over since joining the LCC K-9 Comfort Dog Ministry. I think being present at the vigil was very much appreciated by those who attended. It opened doors and gave some much-needed comfort."
- Several families with young kids, as well as young adults, spent time with Micah and Rahab during the vigil.
- On Saturday, May 29, Micah, Rahab, and Reuben Comfort Dogs spent time with the San Jose 911 Call Center dispatchers. One of them said this was the first time she has seen smiles in days. The Comfort Dogs were certainly mood changers for the staff.
- There was a lady who was afraid of dogs. She observed for quite some time, then eventually stood behind the dogs for a photo and finally got brave enough to pet Reuben. Talk about a smile!

April 2021 – Indianapolis, Indiana: FedEx Facility Mass Shooting

When/Where

LCC responded within 24 hours of an invite to Indianapolis, Indiana, to a mass shooting at FedEx Ground facility that occurred on April 15, 2021. Nine people were killed, including the gunman, 19-year-old former employee Brandon Scott Hole, who committed suicide. Seven others were injured, including four by gunfire.

What

LCC K-9 Ministry teams were present at the following locations:

- Marion County Coroner's Office
- Marion County 911 Call Center
- Multiple Fire Stations
- Eskenazi Hospital
- Indy Island Aquatic Center (where one of the victims worked)
- Vigils held by the community for the victims

Here are just a few stories:

- On Friday night, the Comfort Dogs and their handlers were at Krannert Park, where community members gathered to support the families whose loved ones died during the shooting. It was at this vigil that the Hearts of Mercy and Compassion markers were first brought out for the community to sign, one marker for each of the eight victims. The teams were there with prayer, mercy, compassion and the presence of Jesus Christ for this hurting community.

- The Sunday night vigil was hosted by the City of Beech Grove and the Mayor's Faith-Based Roundtable. Mayor Dennis Buckley of Beech Grove knew one of the victims, 19-year-old Samaria Blackwell. The loss of Samaria was difficult on the Beech Grove community as they knew her and her family well. The vigil was attended by 150 or more people from all different backgrounds: Christians, non-Christians, Sikhs, and Mennonites gathered in unity.

Attendees lined up to sign each of the eight Hearts of Mercy and Compassion markers for the victims to express their grief and share their support. The K-9 Comfort Dogs were there to bring comfort and unconditional love, and the handlers listened and prayed with the community members. There were no walls of hatred but instead unity, healing, and love. People of all backgrounds listened to one another and shared their grief, and most importantly, they shared hope of what could be. Each person left the vigil that night with hope and the beginning process of healing.

When/Where

LCC responded within 24 hours of an invite to Boulder, Colorado, to a mass shooting at King Soopers store that occurred on March 22, 2021. Ten people were killed, including a local on-duty police officer.

When/Where

LCC responded within 24 hours of an invite to a shooting at the Borderline Bar & Grill, a country-western bar frequented by college students, in Thousand Oaks, California that occurred on November 7, 2018. Thirteen people were killed, including the perpetrator, who died of a self-inflicted gunshot wound, and a police officer who was shot multiple times. Ten to twelve others were injured.

While deployed for the shooting in Thousand Oaks, California, the LCC K-9 Comfort Dog Ministry found themselves in the middle of wildfires. The Camp Fire destroyed the town of Paradise and killed at least 85 people. It destroyed more than 18,000 structures, becoming both California's deadliest and most destructive wildfire on record.

What

The LCC K-9 Comfort Dog Ministry worked with the victims of the shootings and others affected at Borderline Bar & Grill. They were also in the middle of the wildfires taking place, and worked with individuals and families that had to evacuate their homes in the widely devastated communities in Butte County, California.

Pastor Tim Barkett of Christ the King Lutheran Church in Newbury Park, California, who had to evacuate his home, shared the following story:

“God had our morning planned before we started. Our devotions did not start on time - no, they did not start at all. From the moment teams gathered in the breakfast areas they came. One by one, family by family. The worried, the tired, and the weary. Sad and teary eyed, their faces brightened as they saw them: LCC K-9 Comfort Dogs Ruthie, Emma, Cubby, Jacob, Hannah, Lois, and Aaron.

It was just what the doctor ordered. A spiritual triage from the wounds of life and recent day's events. Evacuees, Red Cross workers, families from near and far. The LCC K-9 Comfort Dogs were there to listen to their harrowing stories and pray with each one. Sometimes once, sometimes twice, and often as a group with everyone.”

LCC responded within 24 hours of an invite to a mass shooting at Marjory Stoneman Douglas High School in Parkland, Florida that occurred on February 14, 2018. A gunman opened fire with a semi-automatic rifle killing 17 people and injuring 17 others.

What

LCC K-9 Ministry teams were present at the following locations during their two-week deployment:

- Vigil in Parkland, Florida, where many officials and clergy spoke, as well as alumni Anthony Rizzo of the Chicago Cubs
- Memorials for those who lost their lives (including Pine Trails Park which is less than a mile from the high school)
- Multiple public schools in and around Parkland
- Counseling centers that were arranged for those who had to carry on in the aftermath

Here are just a few highlights/stories:

- The K-9 teams spent a great deal of time with students, staff, and faculty during this inconceivable time. They sat with children, sometimes still bandaged or on crutches, while they explained what happened to them or their friends. The teams grieved with family members who have lost a loved one or those who were simply hurting or confused.
- During the first week on-site, along with being at the park, the LCC K-9 Ministry teams were assigned to visit over 20 elementary and middle schools in the surrounding communities to be with children who were afraid to come to or be in school. The teams visited the children and then worked with counselors to help specific children who were still having difficulty understanding what happened. The teams also visited schools where family members had lost loved ones and a school where a first grader had died in a fire. The teachers and staff at each of the schools are doing their very best to help the children feel safe and loved.
- The LCC K-9 Comfort Dog teams and law enforcement handlers from the LCC K-9 Police Ministry were on-site by the memorial that was building at Pine Trails Park, which is less than a mile from the high school. Each day, the number of people

stopping by increased, and the students would return to visit the crosses and stars that marked the memory of their friends and family members. The LCC K-9 Comfort Dogs and their handlers did what they were trained to do - be present, listen, and pray.

- Within days of being in Parkland, the LCC K-9 Comfort Dog Ministry teams received an invitation to work with the counselors of Broward County Schools. The Broward County School District is the sixth largest school district in the United States, with over 300 schools and approximately 300,000 students. The district had just finished their recovery from Hurricane Irma and had also assimilated thousands of children from Puerto Rico into the schools as a result of Hurricane Maria. It was an amazing accomplishment. The shooting at Marjory Stoneman Douglas High School would present another challenge that no school district would ever want to face.
- During the second week of deployment, the teams were assigned by Broward schools to work with teachers, staff, and students at Marjory Stoneman Douglas. Students shared with the handler teams that the LCC K-9 Comfort Dogs made them feel safe and were the reason they had come back to school. Parents thanked the handlers and told them how very much they appreciated the teams being there with their children. Many home visits with those directly impacted were also made.

Among the students was one girl who was wounded in the shooting, while many simply expressed their emotions of shock, grief, and disbelief.

October 2017 – Las Vegas, Nevada: Route 91 Harvest Music Festival Mass Shooting

LCC responded within 24 hours of an invite to a mass shooting during the Route 91 Harvest music festival on the Las Vegas Strip in Nevada that occurred on October 1, 2017. Twenty-six people were killed and twenty others wounded.

Stephen Paddock, a 64-year-old man from Mesquite, Nevada, opened fire upon the crowd attending the festival. Between 10:05 and 10:15 p.m. PDT, he fired more than 1,000 rounds of ammunition from his 32nd floor suites in the Mandalay Bay Hotel, killing 58 people and wounding 413, with the ensuing panic bringing the injury total to 869.

About an hour later, Paddock was found dead in his room from a self-inflicted gunshot wound. His motive remains officially undetermined. The incident is the deadliest mass shooting committed by an individual in the Western Hemisphere.

October 2015 - Roseburg, Oregon: Umpqua Community College Mass Shooting

When/Where

LCC responded within 24 hours of an invite to a mass shooting on the Umpqua Community College campus in Roseburg, Oregon that occurred on October 1, 2015.

Chris Harper-Mercer, a 26-year-old student who was enrolled at the school, fatally shot an assistant professor and eight students in a classroom. Eight others were injured. Roseburg police detectives responding to the incident engaged Harper-Mercer in a brief shootout. After being wounded, he killed himself by shooting himself in the head. The mass shooting was the deadliest in Oregon's modern history.

What

Many parents of students and alumni came to the campus and found calm and relief from the teams' presence and offerings of prayer. The week concluded with memorial services in which the LCC K-9s were asked to participate.

Here are just a few stories:

- The LCC K-9 Ministry teams were present with the faculty, staff, and students at Umpqua Community College as they came back to retrieve lost articles from the day of the shootings. Words cannot describe how strong the emotions were. One by one people recalled the accounts of the day while they petted the comfort dogs. Remembering each minute, where they were and what they heard or saw.

"We heard many accounts of the gunman's question to his targets: "Are you a Christian?" The first person who asked and answered "yes" was shot and killed within seconds. The second person the gunman asked, "Are you a Christian?" knew what would happen if they answered "yes," said "yes" and was executed."

- The teams visited Roseburg High School and Roseburg Fire Station 2. The students shared their stories of the day, as well as the stories of their friends and family who were directly impacted. The first responders were grateful that the K-9 teams came to visit.

"What a difference 10 minutes can make" was a comment we heard over and over again. To calm their fears, to know someone was there to pray for them, to have a "wet nose" of a Golden - helped the students have the strength emotionally to go from one class to the other."

April 2013 – Boston, Massachusetts: Boston Marathon Bombings

LCC responded within 24 hours of an invite to bombings during the annual Boston Marathon, on April 15, 2013, Massachusetts.

Two homemade pressure cooker bombs detonated 14 seconds and 210 yards apart at 2:49 p.m., near the finish line of the race, killing three people and injuring several hundred others, including 17 who lost limbs.

- Jaimie, one of the Boston Marathon runners, opened up that the dogs helped her get out of her house following the traumatic experience, speaking about LCC K-9 Comfort Dog Ruthie:

"She's so sweet... This is the first time I've been out of my house. You know when you just need comfort and you hear that someone is here, people have just been so kind."

- Logan, a local Bostonian after spending time with the LCC K-9 Comfort Dogs shared:

"It's been very tough for the people that were intimately affected by it [Boston Marathon bombings] and I think for anyone that lives by here, works near here, maybe it's a different level of being affected but it feels like someone violated your home. And so I think we are all eager to get back to feeling safe."

- Three marathon volunteers who were working the first aid tent for injured marathon runners experienced much more than they had expected when victims of the bombing were brought to their tent. They came to First Lutheran Church of Boston to spend time with the Comfort Dogs, returning again later that night for more comfort.
- A group of students, who were emotionally worked up after the bombings, could not get themselves to go to the memorial. Members of the LCC team offered to go with them and bring the Comfort Dogs. The students were able to approach the memorial to pay their respects with the emotional support of the Comfort Dogs and their handlers.

December 2012 – Newtown, Connecticut: Sandy Hook Elementary School Mass Shooting

When/Where

LCC responded within 24 hours of an invite to a mass shooting that occurred on December 14, 2012, at Sandy Hook Elementary School in Newtown, Connecticut when 20-year-old Adam Lanza shot and killed 26 people, including 20 children between six and seven years old, and six adult staff members.

Before driving to the school, he shot and killed his mother at their Newtown home. As first responders arrived at the school, Lanza committed suicide by shooting himself in the head. The incident remains the deadliest mass shooting at either a primary or secondary school in U.S. history, the second-deadliest U.S. school shooting overall, and the fourth-deadliest mass shooting in U.S. history

What

- Ten (10) LCC K-9 Ministry teams were working in the community within 48 hours of shooting.
- Working closely with the Connecticut State Crisis Response Coordinator, over 30 LCC K-9 Ministry teams from K-9 affiliates across the country rotated through Sandy Hook Elementary School for five weeks.
- The Comfort Dogs also attended memorials, visited survivors, and were at Newtown High School when the students and staff returned to the school. The dogs' presence meant a lot to the children.
- LCC K-9 Comfort Dog Addie was placed at Immanuel Lutheran Church in Danbury, Connecticut. In addition to Addie, there are two more LCC K-9 Comfort Dogs serving the community to this day: LCC K-9 Comfort Dog Leah (Immanuel Lutheran - Danbury, Connecticut) and LCC K-9 Comfort Dog Maggie (Christ the King Lutheran Church - Newtown, Connecticut).

- Maggie Comfort Dog, with the help of her team of handlers and other volunteers at Christ the King, has faithfully carried out her mission of spreading love, hope, and joy throughout the community, especially at Sandy Hook Elementary School where she continues to serve regularly.
- Maggie has helped students and staff after unexpected student deaths, on December 14 anniversaries, on the first days of the new school years, during moments of feeling anxious or uncertain, after the disturbing news of other school shootings, and during regularly scheduled classroom or individual visits.
- 2016: LCC K-9 Comfort Dog Ruthie was named the ASPCA “Dog of the Year” for her work with her handlers in Newtown, Connecticut in 2012. Ruthie and more than 20 other LCC comfort dogs provided exemplary affection to traumatized children and adults in the months following the awful shooting at Sandy Hook Elementary School.

“Animals like Ruthie go into all these situations where the pain is so great – people just stand over these dogs and pour out their sadness – and they take it all in and carry it with such grace,” Jenny Hubbard, the mother of victim Catherine Violet Hubbard, told the NBC Today show. *“They take it and take it and take it, and they give back love.”*
